
2023 FAIR SPONSORS

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General Rules and Regulations

- 1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the West Lampeter Community Fair.
- 2. The Fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
- 3. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the Fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss, or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
- 4. Entries will be made according to classification. All exhibits are entered free unless otherwise specified under each department.
- 5. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. Same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the exhibit deserves.

The Fair reserves the right to determine how many entries they will accept from any exhibitor in the same class or, in the case of livestock, the same breed.

The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of award, is proved. In such case, the President, Manager or Secretary of the Fair or show, or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision with his approval. The case may be appealed to the Fair Management or Show Commission from whose decision there can be no appeal.

- 6. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock he is entering. Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize but the judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.
- 7. The Committees of a Department reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore the Committees reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, products and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.
- 8. The Fair management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of any exhibit in bad condition; and any article unfit to show or unacceptable to the standards of the West Lampeter Fair Association, will be excluded. No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the Fair except by consent of the management. Regarding livestock, refer to the Department pages concerning dates and times of entering animals.

EXHIBITS MAY BE ENTERED TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 26th ONLY FROM 1:00 TO 9:00 P.M.

An article on display cannot be removed before Friday evening, 9:30 P.M., September 29, 2023.

All exhibits not called for by Saturday, September 30, 2023, by 8:00 a.m., will become property of the Fair, and will be sold Saturday evening with the proceeds deposited in the Fair treasury.

- 9. Every exhibit accepted for premiums must be given an entry tag, which must be plainly marked, showing the name of the exhibit. In the case of livestock, the breed name must be shown on cards large enough that the breed name is readily identified by the viewers or, if the livestock is grouped together according to breeds, one large sign to designate the group will be satisfactory. However, the award winners must be placed on the stall or pen of the individual winners for the duration of the Fair or Show and, winning stickers must appear on such entry tags showing winners. Failure to comply with this regulation will result in forfeiture of premiums. It will be the duty of the Fair or Show officials to see that this regulation is complied with. Where award ribbons are stolen or destroyed, the exhibitor may receive a duplicate at the close of the fair or show which shall be supplied by the fair free of charge. Every exhibitor must get an entry number at the Fair Office, on the Fair grounds, before entering an exhibit in any department.
- 10. During the judging, buildings, except livestock arenas, are to be closed to everyone except fair officials, judges, and necessary attendants. No exhibitor or his agent shall communicate with the judge during time of determining the awards, except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premium to which he would otherwise be entitled.
- 11. No person shall be allowed in the ring while livestock is being judged, except Judge and necessary committee Attendants.
- 12. Should any animals awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position if, in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
- 13. Overfitting of livestock will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition at the discretion of the Committee.
- 14. Joint ownership considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
- 15. *No concessionaires, gambling, or alcoholic beverages* will be permitted at the exhibition or in Fair Advertising of the West Lampeter Community Fair. *No person, firm or corporation* shall sell, or dispose of stock or securities of any corporation, concern or organization of any name or character, during the exhibition. Smoking prohibited by persons preparing and serving food.
- 16. The fair office paging system is intended for fair announcements only, not family member paging. Please be responsible for all your family members. Any lost children should be directed to the fair office and can be found at the fair office.

- 17. No skate boarding or bicycles permitted on grounds during fair hours.
- 18. Dogs on public fair grounds must be on a leash at all times.
- 19. No vehicles permitted to park on fair property for an extended period of time without prior approval.
- 20. All market animals except preview steers that are entered in the fair are automatically consigned to the Youth Market Goat, Lamb, Hog, Dairy Beef, and Beef Cattle Sale to be held on Friday night.
- 21. If a livestock exhibitor's project animal perishes after August 1 that exhibitor is still eligible to participate in showmanship by using another Lampeter Fair livestock exhibitor's animal that is at the fair.

22. FFA Eligibility

- A. Students must be a current Local, State, and National Member as seen on the local chapter roster. This membership must be continual after graduation from high school.
- B. Students **MUST** make **FFA** advisor aware of intent to show project before the fair set date to acquire the project.
- C. Students are eligible for FFA membership until the 4th National Convention after their graduation date. Contact your chapter FFA advisor for current National Convention Date.
- 23. Livestock exhibitors must attend a quality assurance meeting.

24. 4-H and Vocational Rules

- A. 4-H Club members must have passed their eighth birthday but not have passed their nineteenth birthday by January 1 of the current year. Exhibitors must be 4-H members and present a project book at time of entry presentation in the field in which they wish to make entry and be under the supervision of Pennsylvania State University Cooperative Extension Service by July 1 preceding the fair.
- B. Students enrolled in an accepted vocational school curriculum must present a project book or log book in the class in which they wish to make an entry. Students enrolled in general home economics class in a comprehensive high school are considered as qualifying and must present note from teacher. All entries shall be approved prior to the fair by a member of Pennsylvania Department of Education, Agriculture or Family and Consumer Science staff, or their designated representative.
- C. 4-H & FFA—Any animal in the club groups may be shown in the open classes. 4-H & FFA exhibitor shall include any boy or girl who is an Active Member in 4-H or FFA in Lancaster County. The animal shown must be their club project. All entries to be judged as individuals.
- D. PREMIUMS—4-H and FFA members may receive premiums according to placing in both Open and Junior Division classes in the event that there are others in the Open Class beside 4-H and FFA members. If there are only 4-H and FFA members in the Open Class they shall receive Open Class premiums only. Department 11 will use same premiums list as Department 10.

FOR LIVESTOCK HEALTH CERTIFICATION

No animal showing evidence of contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease shall be allowed entrance into the show.

All animals, except market swine, must be accompanied by an approved Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2023 and bear unique permanent identification. MARKET SWINE MUST HAVE A CVI ISSUED WITHIN 14 DAYS OF THE FAIR OR AFTER SEPTEMBER 13, 2023. SWINE MUST BE IDENTIFIED BY AN OFFICIAL 840 RFID EAR TAG. MEMBERS CAN PURCHASE 840 RFID TAGS FROM ACCREDITED VETERINARIANS OR APPLY FOR A PREMISES ID. EAR NOTCHES OR ANY OTHER FORM OF EAR TAGS ARE NOT PERMITTED ON THE CVI

The base date for computing health rules will be the opening day of the show. Animals will not be admitted without the necessary health papers. Certificate of Veterinary Inspection must be available at all times as additional inspections of Certificate of Veterinary Inspection will be made.

ALL CATTLE MUST HAVE AN OFFICIAL RFID EARTAG.



IMPORTANT: ALL HEALTH PAPERS MUST BE CHECKED BEFORE UNLOADING

Be sure to use only grooming products that are approved for use on meat animals when fitting your animals for show and sale. Unapproved products may contain ingredients that result in unacceptable residues in the meat. If you are not certain that a product is residue safe and approved for use on meat animals, **DO NOT USE IT!!**

IMPORTANT - If upon slaughter, treatment with drugs, biologics, or any chemical from fitting products, is the cause of condemnation of a carcass, the loss of the carcass and any other damages will be borne by the exhibitor.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- A. Any individual, business man, firm, company or association has the privilege of exhibiting their goods or products in the commercial exhibit tent, providing the exhibit is in accordance with the following rules and regulations:
 - 1. In every respect the exhibit must be EDUCATIONAL.
 - 2. No concessionaires and gambling will be permitted at the exhibition of the Fair. No person, firm or corporation shall sell, dispose of stock or securities of any corporation, concern or organization of any name or character at any time during the exhibition. No donations can be taken at any time during the Fair by these exhibitors.
 - 3. There will be no soliciting permitted on the Fair grounds.
 - 4. Any merchandise for which an order has been taken is not to be delivered or removed from the grounds during the exhibition.
 - There shall be no misrepresentation or fraud of the products or goods on exhibition.
 - 6. There will be no noise nuisances permitted during the exhibition.
 - 7. The exhibitor is liable for damage or loss of his own property. The exhibits will be guarded during each night of exhibition after 10 o'clock and up to Saturday morning.
 - 8. There shall be no showing of motion pictures on the grounds or in an exhibit space by any one exhibitor at any time during the exhibition, without approval of the committee.
 - 9. Exhibitors shall arrange their displays so they will not obstruct or interfere with other exhibitors. There shall be at least one foot clearance between the tent top and the top of the backdrop of each exhibit. There shall be no solid partitions between any of the booths to exceed 4 feet in height.
 - 10. All moving parts of machines, belts, pulleys and sharp cutting edges or knives are to be guarded by the exhibitor during the Fair at all times.
 - 11. No vehicles permitted to park on Fair property for an extended period of time without prior approval.

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B. Time of Exhibition:

- 1. Exhibits may be placed beginning Tuesday at 9:00 A.M., September 26th.
- 2. All exhibits must be in place by Wednesday, September 27th, by 10:00 A.M., and remain on display up to Friday evening at 9:30 P.M., September 29th.
- 3. All exhibits are to be removed from the tents by Saturday at 10:00 A.M., September 30th.

C. Exhibition Booths:

- 1. There will be display space, 12 feet frontage and 10 feet deep, in a tent.
- 2. Exhibit space to be paid on reservation. All checks should be made payable to West Lampeter Community Fair, Inc., Lampeter, PA.

D. Tent Illumination and Power Services:

 The tent will be properly illuminated with flood lights and any other necessary lights. Power lines of 110 volts will be available at each booth for exhibitor's use.

E. The Committee reserves the right to make any alterations necessary for a successful exhibition. We request your cooperation and support.

Exhibitors are responsible for any advertising materials, booklets, pencils, yard sticks, balloons or any other gimmick left in their booth at any time during the exhibition.

The Committee suggests that all the handout advertising materials be kept in the exhibitor's car or under lock and key at times when the exhibitor's attendant is absent from his exhibit.

Any drawings, prizes or awards to be made by exhibitors shall be made known to the Committee before the Fair officially opens Wednesday noon. Winners' names are to be announced during or at the close of the Fair.

JUDGING RABBITS

All rabbits are to be judged according to the latest standard of perfection of the American Rabbit Breeders Association.

SHOW RULES

The latest rules of the American Rabbit Breeders Association will govern.

- 1. The fair will provide cages which are on a first come first serve basis.
- 2. There will be a maximum of 2 cages per family.
- 3. All rabbits are fed twice each day.
- 4. Rabbits will be locked at all times.
- Meat pens may be entered. They must consist of three (3) rabbits, 60 days old or older.

6. Must know sex and breed of rabbit.

- 7. There will be no Junior or Senior classes.
- 8. Rabbits may not be removed before 9:30 P.M., Friday evening, September 29th, but we request that they are picked up by midnight Friday evening or they will go to the auction.

A supervised farming program is an integral part of Agriculture Education, which provides the students with the practical experiences needed for proficiency in farming.

4-H is the youth segment of Co-operative Extension, which is an integral part of Penn State University. The goal of 4-H is to teach each member life skills and build self-esteem and citizenship.

The goats, lambs, hogs, dairy beef, and beef cattle consigned for sale are direct results of practical training in Agriculture Education, FFA and 4-H.

The Youth Market Goat, Lamb, Hog, Dairy Beef & Beef Cattle Sale is open to FFA and 4-H exhibitors and is limited to students from Lampeter-Strasburg, Penn Manor, Pequea Valley and Solanco School Districts. To be sold, the animals must have been shown in the FFA or 4-H classes of the fair.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- Every animal consigned is pledged to absolute sale. If there are two or more bids on the same group of animals they shall be sold to the highest bidder. There will be one sale committee and all animals can be paid with one check.
- 2. The animals will be sold as shown. Each group will consist of light, medium, and heavy weight classes as shown and judged. The hogs will weigh between 230 and 290 lbs. and the lambs must weigh 100 lbs. and over. The market cattle must weigh 1000 lbs. and over, and Dairy Beef weight must weigh 600 pounds and over. Market goats must weigh 55 pounds and over. Farm show preview steers will not be sold.
- 3. The official weigh-in upon arrival at the Fair will become the weight the animal is sold at Friday night.
- 4. The terms of settlement for the sale are CASH. No animal is to be removed from the Fair grounds until satisfactory settlement has been made with the sales clerk.
- 5. The animals sold may be removed anytime after the completion of the sale and not later than 8:00 A.M., Saturday.
- 6. All market swine exhibited shall move directly to a PDA or USDA licensed slaughter facility following the fair. Hogs may not be directed to premises other than a recognized slaughter establishment or a slaughter market in which the sales are designated slaughter only sales.
- 7. All animals are at risk and expense of buyers when struck off, but every possible courtesy will be given buyers to protect their interest. The management acts as agent only and cannot assume responsibility for any animal in the sale.



- 1. ELIGIBILITY—The FFA and 4-H dairy beef steer show is open to active members in Lampeter-Strasburg and Penn Manor School Districts.
- All dairy beef must be Holstein or Brown Swiss born between Jan. 1 February 28, 2023. NO CROSSBREEDS.
- 3. Entries will be received on showman.app ON OR BEFORE SEPTEMBER 1ST, NO EXCEPTIONS. There will be no entry charge.
- 4. OWNERSHIP—Dairy beef must be secured by Feb. 28 and be in the care of the FFA or 4-H member. Each member is to have entire charge and care of his/her animal. FFA and 4-H members can only sell one dairy beef per member.
- 5. HEALTH—No animal showing evidence of contagious, infectious, or external parasitic disease including ringworm, warts, lice, and mange will be accepted to the show and/or sale. Dairy beef must be dehorned and castrated. All animals must be accompanied by an approved Certificate of Veterinary Inspection prepared by an accredited veterinarian issued after May 1, 2023. All dairy beef must be identified by an official RFID eartag. No brucellosis test is required and no Tuberculosis test is required.
- 6. ALL dairy beef are to be entered from 4:00 P.M. 8:00 P.M. on Tuesday and remain on the grounds until the conclusion of the Livestock sale on Friday evening.
- 7. All animals must be halter broke and trained to lead without the use of artificial means.
- 8. All animals are to be fitted and prepared for show by the exhibitor. The beef committee strongly recommends that clipping of animals is done at home.
- 9. The exhibitor must furnish all feed and related equipment. Mulch will be provided for bedding. Absolutely no straw will be allowed for Dairy Beef.
- 10. LIABILITY Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any loss, injury or damage done arising from any animals exhibited by him if such loss or damage is due to negligence on his part. Any individual, spectator, or patron handling animals without the consent of the owner is liable for all damage or injury done to themselves or animals.



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- Before showing exhibitors need to have attended an ethics and responsibility meeting.
- 12. WEIGHING Exhibitors must be present when the dairy beef are weighed. Dairy beef will be weighed Tuesday and will be sold on Friday night based on that weight. Dairy beef weighing less than 600 pounds may not be shown and must be removed from the fairgrounds immediately after weighing. The decision of the weigh master is final. There will be no reweighs. Classes will be divided according to weights after weigh-in.
- 13. Judging will be done by weight classes. The committee will determine the number of classes and the number of entries per class.
- 14. The first place individual in each weight class shall be eligible to compete for Champion and Reserve Champion of the show.

RULES

- 1. Eligibility—The FFA and 4-H Swine show is open to active members in Lampeter-Strasburg, Penn Manor, Solanco and Pequea Valley School Districts.
- 2. Entries will be received on showman.app ON OR BEFORE SEPTEMBER 1ST, NO EXCEPTIONS. Limit two (2) hogs per exhibitor. Entries will be accepted on a first come-first served basis in order of registration. There will be no entry charge.
- 3. Before showing exhibitors need to have attended an ethics and responsibilities meeting.
- 4. WEIGHT—All hogs must be received between 4 P.M. and 8 P.M. Tuesday. To be eligible for the show and sale, hogs must weigh between 230 and 290 pounds. Any animals not in that weight range will be rejected and MUST leave the fairgrounds that evening. Weighmasters decision is final there will be NO reweighs. Exhibitors must be present to help weigh and tag their market hogs.
- 5. OWNERSHIP—Market hogs must be secured by July 1 and be in the care of the FFA or 4-H member. Each member is to have entire charge and care of his/her animal. All market hogs will be gilts or barrows. Hogs under the care of exhibitors are not to be fed paylean/ractopamine. FFA and 4-H members who participate in both organizations must determine which organization the animals will be entered in by July 1.
- 6. HEALTH—An official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection signed by an accredited veterinarian must accompany all swine. It must state that the animal(s) show no signs of contagious or infectious disease. Any hog showing any physical evidence of communicable disease or unthriftiness will not be admitted to the show. THE CVI MUST BE ISSUED WITHIN 14 DAYS OF THE FAIR OR AFTER SEPTEMBER 13, 2023. THE CVI MUST LIST SWINE IDENTIFIED ONLY BY AN OFFICIAL 840 RFID EAR TAG. EXHIBITORS CAN PURCHASE 840 RFID TAGS FROM ACCREDITED VETERINARIANS OR APPLY FOR A PREMISES ID. EAR NOTCHES OR OTHER EAR TAGS ARE NOT PERMITTED ON THE CVI.
- 7. CARE OF THE ANIMALS—the exhibitor must furnish all feed, feed troughs, water pails, etc. Shavings will be provided. Each exhibitor feeds and cares for his animals during the Fair.
- 8. Clipping If hogs are clipped for the show and sale the hair length must be no shorter than 3/4 inch.



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

- Open to any individual amateur baker (ages 8 through 18 at the time of the fair's contest) who is a Pennsylvania resident. One entry per person.
- 2. Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Preferred® Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2023.
- 3. Entry must be six (6) individual sized portions of the baked entry item (cookies, brownies or bars).
- Entire entry must be made from scratch. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (ex: pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.). All ingredients and decorations must be edible.
- At least two (2) PA Preferred® or locally purchased ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (such as oats or flour), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
- A PA Preferred® logo is not required because not all PA Preferred® products carry the label. The name of the
 ingredient and the source is sufficient (see attached example). Contact RA-AGPAPreferred@pa.gov for any
 assistance with qualifying ingredients.
- Entry must be submitted for judging on a food safe disposable setting. (All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.)
- 8. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2" x 11" paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. The name of each PA Preferred® ingredient or locally purchased ingredient must be clearly listed clearly along with the source that made/grew the product (ex: PA Preferred Milk Galliker's brand or Apples Smith Farm Orchard). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages. (All recipes and cookies-brownies-bars will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.) See recipe example on page 68.
- Refrigeration is <u>not</u> available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate
 so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for
 food safety reasons.

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HEALTH INFORMATION

Requirements:

- A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the opening dates of the exhibition is required. Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test results and date of the test must be included on the CVI.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI). Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
- 3. All equine animals must have tested negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. A copy of the official test results must accompany each animal to its final destination. Foals less than 6 months of age accompanied by a dam which meets the above requirements are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
- 4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older. All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.



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Lampeter Fair Tractor Pull Guidelines

- 1. All tractors must be of year | 959 or older.
 - 2. Drawbar maximum height is 18".
 - 3. Drawbar length from center of rear axle to hook point should be no less than 24"
 - 4. No shifting of gears during the pull.
 - 5. Tractor must be at fairgrounds for the show in order to pull.
 - 6. Owners and operators will be pulling at THEIR OWN RISK!
- Tractors must be stock in appearance and operating at no more than 10% over stock RPM's.
 - 8. Tractors must have factory size tires or tires no more that 2 sizes over factory.
 - Tractors will be placed in classes based on factory horsepower. Weight and other factors may be taken into consideration.
 - 10. The operator must remain seated and have complete control of the tractor at all times.
 - 11. The flagman is the boss. Tractors should not proceed until they have a green flag. Tractors must stop when red flagged. All violations will be disqualified.
 - Tractors will pull no more than one time in the evening, unless the committee decides differently.
 - 13. If any parts or weights fall off the tractor during the pull, the tractor will be disqualified.
 - 14. Tractors must be operated in a safe manner at all times. NO tractor should be left unattended with the engine running.
 - 15. THE PULLING COMMITTEE'S DECISIONS ARE FINAL!
 - 16. Drivers under the age of 16 must have a parent or guardian present during the pull. The committee reserves the right to prevent anyone from driving who does not seem in control of the tractor.
 - 17. A drivers meeting will be held 15 minutes prior to each pull to review the rules and any current issues, All drivers must attend!

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
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


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
